Marni was born into a Christian home and has been a Christian all of her life. She has one brother, two half-sisters, and three step brothers. She attended Cashing Elementary School in Fort Lauderdale, Florida (grades 1 - 6), Walkertown Junior High in North Carolina (grades 7 - 8), and Carver High in Winston-Salem, North Carolina (grades 9 - 10). In 1983, at the age of 16 years old, in the spring of tenth grade, she was in a major car accident resulting in TBI (traumatic brain injury) leaving her in a coma for three months in Winston-Salem at Forsyth Medical Center. When released from the hospital, she went home. Her family moved to Sparta, North Carolina where she attended Alleghany High School and graduated. The school built an elevator for her and another student in wheelchairs.



Marni lived in Gallatin, Tennessee at a rehabilitation center for three years and was part of the Rebound Revivers where she sang and wrote music. Two of the songs she wrote are called "Second Chances" and "One of These Days."

Marni lived in a group home in Durham, North Carolina for four years and in West Jefferson, North Carolina for 16 years. She moved to Tim and Jamie Grindley's home in September, 2016. During these past two years, she has lost weight, gained strength in her legs, and most importantly grown spiritually in her belief and walk with Jesus.

One of her favorite Bible passages, which she has memorized is Psalm 23. Her hobbies are singing, writing music, and puzzle books like word searches.

and thus later he will be called “the First Philosopher”. Plato’s view for our existence was that the world we live in is not the real world. According to him, there is another existing world - perfect and parallel to ours. Our material world is just a shadow of this perfect immaterial world. As example, the main idea for the movie “The Matrix” is a pure Platonic idea that fed the minds of the Millennials. Plato thought that it is impossible for our world to know the perfect world, or may be just a little bit to know it. According to him, the human soul is a self-contained entity and it is borrowed temporarily for our bodies from the perfect world. He tries to illustrate this with “the allegory of the cave” where he pictures our materialistic world as people, living in a cave without contact with the outside perfect world. All they can see is the shadows of the objects on the walls from the outside light. Unless the person is dragged out or crawls out of the cave and gets in contact with the real world, he will never learn the real things. That’s why Plato focuses more to obtain knowledge by thinking rather than observation of our world. For him, the true knowledge comes when our soul receive revelation from the

perfect world. To better describe his theory, he creates his own vocabulary in his famous book “Timaeus” (Dialogue) where he calls the different things “forms”. His term for “forms” has many meanings. For instance, let’s look at the geometrical form circle – a curve where all points are at equal distance from a common center. In our imperfect world we cannot draw a perfect circle. Any circle we can draw, with the help of tools, when zoomed closely, will be seen with wiggles and imperfections. But then, according to Plato, the perfect formed circle exists in the perfect, unreachable to our world or maybe just a little bit reachable, but only with our thoughts, and by revelation. All that we see here, in our world, is the shadow of it. This corresponds also to the animal kingdom - the form of the perfect horse exists in the perfect world while we, in our material world, see just shadows of the perfect horse with all kinds of variations and imperfections. This will make us agree that Helen of Troy was beautiful but not really, really. She also possesses some imperfections. The perfect form of beauty exists only in the perfect world and she is just imperfect shadow of it. According to Plato, the figure responsible for fashioning and maintaining our physical universe is called Demiurge. Demiurge is not the ultimate Creator because he as well deviates from something else. It is good to mention here that the Gods of the Greeks do not possess personality, something that we see essential for the God of the Bible.

Diluting the Gospel with External Viewpoints

Part 2 – Plato and “The School of Athens”

Somebody will question, “Why we, as Christians, need to study the ancient Greek philosophy?” I will agree with that. We do not have to if we live in a perfect world or stay closed in “the cocoon” of the church. Unfortunately, we do not. We want to try to reach out to the community and spread the Gospel. The Christian theology today is mixed with so many outside human ideas that it is such an effort to reach the public and present it in a pure form. For every Biblical idea there are many out of the context beliefs that the common people do not know where they came from but yet they follow them. It is a real battle for every inch of Biblical ground. Many times, during conversations with other people, when we try to prove a Biblical point, it is not enough just to say, “This is not in my Bible”. It is important to explain the origins of this particular belief and how it entered into the Christianity. For the common person today to find the truth is not as we used to say “to find a needle in a bale of hay”. Instead, it is like to find the needle in many bales of hay. For example, it is amazing how the views of the philosophers from the Hellenistic period have influenced the societies

in the past and how they are still echoing in our modern times. The Hellenistic period covers the age of the Mediterranean history between the death of Alexander the Great in 323 BC and the emergence of the Roman Empire in 31 BC. The Hellenistic views for the world, the ethics, the state governments, and the origins of our existence ruled the universities in the East and the West all the way until the Renaissance, reaching directly to our days. For more than 2300 years they became the standard and the measure of judging every thought and philosophical idea that springs out of the secular world. You and I, to some extent, are influenced from them as well. Today, leading Christian denominations also are twisting the Bible to make it agree with the principals of these philosophies and the leading scientific dogmas of the day. I think that we cannot properly approach these matters unless we understand them and find their roots. Let’s start.

Plato lives between 428 and 347 BC in Athens, ancient Greece. He draws his knowledge from Socrates. Later in his life he enriches and further advances the teachings he inherited from his teacher. Socrates was a big speaker and he was able to steer a lot of discussion in the ancient Greece, but Plato is the one who systemize his teachings and present them in a rational form

Each team needs to designate a head person.

A few days before Sabbath, call and get volunteers to bring items for the salad bar.

Day before Sabbath set enough water pitchers in refrigerator for each table to chill.

Decorate tables with table cloth, salt and pepper, cups, decoration if desired, number stand.

Four tables should be set up for food with table cloths and hot pads. These tables will have labels at each end to designate what goes on that table.

Another table will have the silverware (or plastic ware) and napkins.

Another table will have the plates and numbering balls to call out.

Another table will have the bowls and tongs next to the salad bar for the salad. Also, a place is needed for the salad dressings. The grey rolling cart can be used.

Another small table is needed for the desserts and you can use the counter.

Next to the door place a tub for the dirty silverware if using and food scrapes. Be sure the garbage cans have liners.

Morning of Sabbath lunch

1. Plug in heater and check water level
2. Plug in salad bar – be sure all containers and tongs are available

3. Set out plates and small bowls for the salad bar.

4. On the tables put bowls for popcorn and any soup.

5. Cut up desserts as they arrive and cover before you leave the room for Sabbath School.

6. Set out serving spoons and silverware or plastic ware.

7. Be sure the salad bar is completely set up.

After church

1. Put out the water pitchers
2. Set out the warmed food.
3. Be sure each food has a serving spoon and is unwrapped,
4. Uncover the desserts.
5. After everyone is seated have prayer and call numbers for serving.
6. Unplug the heating unit.

Clean up after eating

1. Pick up the silverware (if not using plastic) from the container and place in the dishwasher.
2. Unplug salad bar. Remove all the food from the salad bar. Place the food in storage containers or trash. The containers need to be washed by hand, but the tongs can go into the dishwasher.
3. Remove all the large spoons from the dishes on the tables if everyone is done eating and rinse and place in the dishwasher.
4. Gather all the hot pads and clean the tables.
5. Gather up everything from the tables: salt and pepper, cups if not used, water pitchers, decorations if used, trash and table cloths.

6. Water pitchers need to be washed once a month.

7. Pick up all the desserts if left and discard or cover and give away.

8. Wash and dry any large dishes.

9. Turn on dishwasher.

10. Trash needs to be taken out.

11. Floors need to be swept.

12. Lights out.

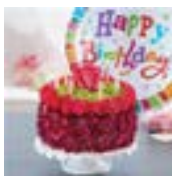

Spiders

If you're not a fan of spiders, you're far from alone. But before you swat away another spider web, remember this: Relative to weight, the strength of a spider web rivals steel and Kevlar, the material used to make bullet-proof vests. (That's important when your dinner flies headlong into your trap and writhes violently as it tries desperately to escape.) This tensile strength has inspired humans to develop a surprising number of products — but it's just one of the fascinating facts that may give even arachnophobes a new appreciation for these eight-legged architects.

Spider silk is five times stronger than steel. Some webs are so strong that they can withstand a hurricane. If one thread breaks, the whole web actually becomes stronger.

Spiders are like tiny silk production factories. Inside their bodies, thread is

stored as a highly concentrated liquid. A common garden spider can produce as many as seven types of silk, each made up of a different sequence of proteins. Each type of thread serves a distinct purpose: one, for example, makes the web stretchy to better absorb the impact of insects smacking into it; another makes the thread less brittle. Still other proteins protect the threads from bacteria and fungi, and keep it moist.

The nursery web spider is so named because she uses her web to house her babies.

Argiope aurantia's nickname: the writing spider. The name was extended because of the series of x's it spins down the center of the web.

There are over 1500 species of spiders in the Carolinas, but only two types of spiders in the Carolinas can do humans any harm – The Black Widow and Brown Recluse.
